Recommendations 1

 - equity,
 - efficiency,
 - impact
 - sustainability
 - Poverty reduction



Recommendation 2

- Governments to sign agreement for Water as Human Right
- Pay attention to current issues: wars, refugees, climate change, HIV-Aids, in relation to women and water
- Investments in sanitation have enormous economic returns
- METROPOLIS to put sanitation-for-all on top of agenda for 2008
